### **Welcome to Term 3**

### **Launch Camp**

Launch Camp is for students in Year 10-12 who have been encouraged by their home church to consider Christian leadership. It is an opportunity to hear from the Bible, be equipped in ministry skills and connect with peers from other churches who love Jesus and want to serve him.

This year, Launch Camp ran from June 30-July 4, and was attended by five of our youth from RPC/Shore Hope: Tessa, Anna, Benaiah, Jacob and Jonathan.

Here is a quick snapshot of Jonathan's experience at Launch Camp this year:

#### Q1. In your own words, why does Launch Camp exist?

Launch camp exists to provide a way for the next generation of Christians to learn useful, and necessary skills for going into ministry, or becoming future, well-educated laity.

#### Q2. What ministry skills were you being equipped in at Launch Camp this year?

The focused skill that I was equipped with, was walk up evangelism, with an eye to learning evangelism in general, and utilizing these skills for people within my life. However, the camp is also designed to equip many other ministry skills, and even some theological training.

#### Q3. What aspects of the camp encouraged you?

The largest encouragement was that there were close to 100 others there. The fact that so many people were so willing to go to a camp like Launch camp (which doesn't have any dedicated time to traditional forms of 'fun', [it does have a very large block of free time, don't let the lack of managed fun scare you off]), was very encouraging.

#### Q4. What would you say to youth considering this camp in the future?

Go. The camp was really good. Besides, a camp can't bite, and the people there are really nice (also the food was great).

#### **PRAY**

Pray for Tessa, Jonathan, Benaiah, Anna and Jacob who attended Launch Camp from Redlands/Shore Hope. Pray for them as they grow from the Bible teaching they heard and learn how they can use the ministry skills they learned in their daily lives. Pray for opportunities for our youth to serve Jesus in our local churches.

### **Women's Teaching Day 2025**

What will we do with our messy lives? Should we polish them up and sort them out before we try to love God and love others? This was the question that the women who attended the teaching day wanted to grapple with.

On May 25th at the Women's Teaching Day, Clare Deeves helped us to think through how to have good expectations about our lives as followers of Jesus. We really appreciated her clear and faithful teaching from Romans 8 and Psalm 38 and her encouragement to be real with God. She reminded us that God is for us in Christ and to trust him. We also heard from other women in our congregation as they shared their experiences of trusting God with hard things and how he had continued to be faithful to them in all kinds of ways.

Around 75 women from Capalaba, Shore Hope, Wynnum and Manly-Lota Presbyterian churches as well as the Reformed Church in Ormiston joined together. We enjoyed incredible food and great fellowship throughout the day. It was so encouraging to sit under God's word, pray and sing together.

**Next year** we are planning to hold the Women's Teaching Day on Saturday, 23rd May. If you are a woman, we hope you join us; if you aren't, we hope you can pray for us and enable the women in your life to attend!







### Hebrews - "Better"

Built into our culture is a longing to be "Better..." To achieve faster speeds, settle distant planets, run cleaner technology, develop more powerful technology, become better people...


Can we do the same in our relationship with God? How can we be "better" spiritually?

That was certainly the concern of the author of the book of the Bible we're studying this term. Writing to Jewish Christians (Hebrews) who were feeling pressure to abandon Jesus and stick to only being Jewish, the letter to the Hebrews insists there's a real difference between following Jesus and any other religion. Jesus is better.

Especially, he's better than any other way God had provided before Jesus for knowing him and being right with him. (Check out the diagram over the page to see how the letter holds together.)

While we aren't tempted by Jewish religious practices, there's plenty of times we're tempted to think that today there's something better than Jesus. That peace of mind, a successful life, satisfaction in our relationships - that our modern insights and wisdom offer something better than we'll find in the Bible. So, we still need the message of this ancient wisdom, preserved for us: Jesus is Better.

# God spoke through his Son

### Study 1

#### Warm-up

3. What/who is the difference between the way God spoke to the ancestors and the way he speaks to us in these last days (for last days see Isaiah 2:2; Dan 10:14; Mic 4:1)?

4. There are seven huge statements in verses 2 to 4 outlining the attributes and work of the Son. List them and discuss them.

5.	According to verse 3, why is Jesus uniquely qualified to be the revealer of God?
6.	What is the significance of Jesus sitting down at the right hand of the Majesty in heaven?
7.	What role did the angels play in the past (see Acts 7:38-39)? This passage is another way of saying Christ is the supreme revealer of God to us. The author finishes his opening exhortation by reminding us that this makes complete sense, as the name he has inherited is superior to theirs. What does verse 5 tells us the name he has inherited is?
Inter 8.	act  As we experience different things in our world and in our life today so many questions come up that we would like to ask God. How has does God's Son answer these questions for us?
9.	Quite often Christians say things like, 'I'm waiting for a word from the Lord'. According to this passage what does God have left to say to us? And why might we not be satisfied with what we have heard?
