Welcome to Term 1 2025!

In Romans 10:9 Paul writes...

If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.

"Jesus is Lord"! It's the Christian confession. Yet perhaps we're so familiar with it, we forget its weightiness. To declare "Jesus is Lord" is to acknowledge that we are not. It's to confess that he has authority over every aspect of life. We often struggle with that.

In Term 1, we're picking up Mark's gospel where we left it last year - we'll be looking at Mark 11-16. These chapters focus our attention on the authority of Jesus, and the sinful human instinct to reject his authority. Tension between Jesus and the religious leaders is rising. And through their interactions, Mark skilfully challenges our heart attitudes towards Jesus' authority.

We don't often enjoy submitting to the authority of another. Australians are particularly suspicious of those with great power. Yet the surprising and exhilarating thing about Jesus is that although he is the most powerful person to ever live, he uses his power to serve. Jesus is Lord, yet his Lordship is expressed in him laying down his life for ours. We look forward to exploring this in the term ahead.

Missions Update.

Spotlight on our AFES university ministry partners

Tim & Jeanne Iedema, with Evita, Grace, Anna & Lydia AFES FOCUS at the University of Southern Queensland (UniSQ) Toowoomba

An Interview with Tim:

Q: How long were you working with AFES FOCUS at QUT? T: Initially we only planned to be working for one year but ended up serving there for 7 years.

Q: What has prompted your move to work with AFES FOCUS at UniSQ?

T: A number of factors. We first started thinking about it as Jeanne's parents are getting older and need some more support. As we explored ministry options with the AFES team up in Toowoomba, we realised that there are some great opportunities to be reaching international students (and other migrants) in this growing regional city.

Q: What are some things that you and the girls are finding hard about the move to Toowoomba?

T: We have loved living in the Redlands with family and leaving them and the QUT Christians ministry is really hard. In some ways we know a bit about what to expect in Toowoomba, but there are so many unknowns too. Everything is a new beginning - school, church, neighbourhood, ministry team.

Q: What are some things that you are looking forward to about the move?

T: We look forward to everything being geographically closer - home, school, church, uni.

We hope this means we can share more quality time with people around God's Word and look forward to being able to serve together more as a family.

Q: Describe in a few words what UniSQ Toowoomba is like?

T: Toowoomba is the main campus for UniSQ. There's a range of different courses but popular ones for international students are nursing, engineering, and IT. About 20% of students on campus are international students. Many of these international students come from South Asian countries like India. You can imagine how different it is for someone from bustling India (where nothing ever stops) to live in quiet Toowoomba (where everything closes early).

Q: Tell us some things about the UniSQ FOCUS group that you will be leading? T: FOCUS is the international student ministry of UniSQ Christian Students, the AFES group on campus. It was started two years ago by a UniSQ ministry apprentice, who has since gone on to study at Bible college. It has had a really positive start, including a number of students who became Christians last year. It's still small but has students from India, Bangladesh, Taiwan, and Papua New Guinea. The main weekly gathering is Thursday nights and there are lots of other opportunities for discipleship and training throughout the week.

I look forward to working with the existing students to help equip them to share Jesus with their classmates and grow as disciple-making disciples.

Q: How can we pray for you and your family and the new ministry? T: Please pray for:

- A good start to relationships with the existing AFES UniSQ staff team and students.
- That existing FOCUS students will be able to get behind the vision of reaching the nations and that they will grow as faithful leaders to the younger students.
- Our kids as they settle into a new school that they will form friendships.
- Pray that as a family we grow in our faith through this move and that we make the most of gospel opportunities in these new contexts.

Mark...The Story So Far.

It's been a while since we began our journey in Mark's gospel, so here's a brief recap.

Mark is all about Jesus, the true King. He bursts onto the scene in Mark 1, easily defeating evil spirits, healing sickness, calling people to follow him and even beating Satan. This pales beside his claim in chapter 2: that he can forgive sins, which he proves by raising the paralysed man. This means that he is no less than God himself. He continues to show his authority through his teaching and miracles as he journeys, followed by huge crowds.

Yet, this tremendous power that Jesus shows is not spent on self-promotion. Early on, he seems intent on keeping himself a secret, but his concern for people and their suffering as he has compassion on them moves him to exhausting miracle sessions. He is kind to sufferers: the important people who come asking for miracles through to the many 'nameless' people in Mark. His healing ministry is characterised by generosity and a willingness to engage with people from all ages and walks of life.

Jesus selects disciples early in his ministry and they journey with him. The miracles and teachings are there to enable their faith in him, the true Messiah, to grow. His teachings show what kind of king he will be and what his kingdom is like. Sometimes they seem to understand, but other times, they seem unable to understand who he is. Jesus continues to be patient with them, explaining who he is and what will happen to him multiple times. He warns his disciples that those who follow him must walk the same path of self-sacrifice that he is walking, and that they are not to seek greatness, just as Jesus came to serve others by dying for them.

It doesn't take long for him to attract deep opposition. Indeed, early in the book the Herodians and the Pharisees - the bitterest of enemies - unite to plot his death. This conflict grows as the book continues. Jesus does not seem to dampen it down but uses each occasion to teach them something (if they could only listen!). He offends them as he heals on the Sabbath, teaches what they do not want to hear (for example Mark 10) and exposes their sin. As we enter Mark 11, they have been appalled at the crowds' reception of Jesus as the Messiah. They are beside themselves as they see his increasing influence and authority over the crowds and their determination to do away with him has reached a fever pitch. As we pick up the story we will see their fury in the way they try to catch him out in his answers and finally as they concoct a plot to have Judas betray him.

The opposition of these folk to the Lord Jesus does not deter him, nor does he seem dismayed or upset by it. Throughout the book of Mark, he relentlessly speaks truth to them, both about who he is and what they are doing by rejecting him.


As we enter Jerusalem with Jesus in Mark 11, we know so much about him. He knows he will be handed over to the Gentiles, mocked and beaten, unjustly tried and crucified. He also knows he will rise again. We know that Jesus knows this will happen soon and in Jerusalem, so as we see him enter Jerusalem we know what will happen next, and we know that he knows. His courage is remarkable.

We also know that Jesus is always in charge of things. We have seen this time and again through the gospel. He always seems to win the arguments. He is in control of nature, sickness and evil spirits. He has authority to forgive sins. As we move through Mark 11 and the following chapters, we will see that power wielded constantly, but always with generosity and honesty. Whether teaching his own or putting his opponents in their place Jesus is constantly inviting everyone to trust in him as their true Messiah King.

Quickly skim read through Mark 11:1-26. What happened? Who was for Jesus? Who was against Jesus? What did Jesus say just before verse 27? (verse 22-26)

9.	Jesus is fearless in the face of opposition and speaks about his own death at the hands of people who hate him with such courage. How do you want to respond to that? How might remembering this regularly make a difference to your life?
10.	What does it mean to you that Jesus is not just smarter than you, but that he is smarter than everyone you meet (even those who have an answer for everything!)? What difference does this make to you as you engage with your non-Christian family and friends?

10.	Compare the attitudes of the chief priests (14:1-2) and Jesus' (14:8-9) to his future death. How do you want to respond to Jesus' confidence and courage?

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8.	How does 14:12-16 add to our confidence that Jesus knew exactly what would happen to him? Why does this matter to us today?
9.	Why does Jesus say 14:21? How does this help us to understand Judas' knowledge of what he was doing when he betrayed Jesus?
10.	How does this retelling of the first Lord's Supper help you as you prepare to take the Lord's Supper in church with your fellow Christians?
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8.	Describe the ways that Jesus is let down by his closest friends and disciples in this passage, and Jesus' responses to them. How does this encourage and challenge us, as his followers today?
9.	What can we learn about prayer from Jesus' prayer in the garden of Gethsemane?
10.	How does Jesus' pointing forward to his resurrection help us to have confidence in him today?
